About Namibia A Short History

Namibia was largely spared the attentions of European powers until the end of the 19th century, when Germany colonised it in 1884 and declared it a German colony calling it German South-West Africa. In 1918, after Germany's defeat in the World War 1, the League of Nations entrusted the territory to South Africa, and the territory then became known as South West Africa.

In April 1978 the UN Plan called for the holding of elections in Namibia, under UN supervision and control. However, in November 1978, South Africa, in defiance of the UN, tightened its grip on the country and imposed apartheid rule until well into the 1980s.

The South-West Africa People's Organisation (SWAPO) began it's armed struggle to liberate Namibia in 1966 and in 1971. South Africa was eventually forced out by a combination of United Nations pressure and guerrilla warfare from SWAPO. In 1989, elections gave SWAPO a majority of seats in a constituent assembly. The new nation, called Namibia and led by the elected President Sam Nujoma, became independent on 21 March 1990 and Independence Day is annually celebrated on this date.

To date, Namibia boasts a proud record of uninterrupted peace and stability for all to enjoy and is considered one of the most stable and safe countries on the African continent.

Currency

Namibian Dollar N\$ (which is linked to and equals in value to the South African Rand which is also a legal tender in Namibia.)

Climate

Namibia has mostly a subtropical desert climate with the rainy season occuring between September to April. The summer months (Oct-Apr) can become hot with temperatures hitting 35°C or higher in the north and south. Winter days (May-Sept) are pleasant although temperatures can
